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ABOUT THE FOUNDATION

Mr. G.W. (Bill) Harris, a long time Mission resident and former Mayor, saw the need for a facility whereby Mission residents would be able to leave funds, in perpetuity, for the long term benefit of the community and its citizens.

Such a facility was available through a charitable foundation. He, together with others of similar vision, approached the then Dewdney Constituency M.L.A.'s for their backing. Austin Pelton and Norm Jacobsen sponsored Bill Pr404 and the Mission Foundation was born. Financial assistance during its formative stages was provided by the Mission Rotary and Kinsmen Clubs, McKnight Johnson and Partners and by the founders.

The Foundation is managed by a Board of eleven individuals ,chosen to represent the diversity and various interests in the community. There are six appointed members and the balance representing the District of Mission, School District #75, Mission Regional Chamber of Commerce, Mission Community Services Society and Fraser Valley Regional District.

The first funds entrusted to the Mission Foundation came through the Estate of the late Margaret Erskine, in the amount if \$228,000. Subsequently the Foundation benefited from the "...friends of Bill..." until now, in addition to the General Fund, there are 44 funds with assets worth approximately \$1,300,000. Most of the funds are "open" and can receive funds from any donor, inmemoriam, or at anytime. In addition to asset-building, MF responds to ongoing inquiries as to opportunities that might be administered by the Foundation.

An Investment Committee acts with the Trustee, RBC Dominion Securities Inc., in using expert financial advice for the administration of the funds entrusted to the Foundation.

The Mission Foundation will receive funds in any amount, and issues receipts for Income Tax purposes to all donors. A minimum of \$10,000. is required to establish a new, named Fund.

<u>LEGAL STATUS</u>: The Foundation was established by an Act of the B.C. Legislature on June 19, 1987.

INCOME TAX STATUS

The Foundation is registered with the Department of National Revenue as a Public Foundation under rules applicable to Registered Charities. Donations qualify for individual tax relief pursuant to Charitable Registration No. 119042810R0001

Administrative Costs

The following is a detailed break-down of 2003 operation costs, compared with 2002.

These costs are paid for by charging each fund an amount that is 1% of the capital held in that fund, plus 100% of the revenue earned by the Enabling Fund. If and when this total amount does not cover the year's expenses, the remainder is taken from the General Fund.

All directors and committee members are volunteers. The only paid position in the Foundation is the Office Manager, who is hired by yearly contract.

ASSET DEVELOPMENT

Throughout the year the committee continued to work with a focus on "Asset Building", being available to assist potential new benefactors in planning their gifting, and seeing the appropriate "Deeds of Trust" drawn.

Of particular value has been the strengthening of the relationship with Woodlawn Funeral Home's Mission branch, and we particularly acknowledge the guidance received from the manager, Riette Kenkel, and the caring attention to detail from her support staff, particularly Phyllis. This partnership has resulted in the establishment of a number of new "In Memoriam" funds. Riette now serves as a valuable member of the Asset Development committee.

As the committee discussed various initiatives it became very clear that a closer liaison with the Public Relations committee would be of great benefit, and so the committee recommended to the Board that a trial period with the two committees blending to function as one combined committee be considered. This trial will be implemented at the beginning of 2004.

Planned for 2004 are a series of small group lunches focussed on the existing Benefactors, inviting them to bring a close acquaintance to learn of the opportunities offered by the Foundation in helping them achieve their philanthropic goals, and also allowing the existing Benefactors the opportunity to share with committee members the pros and cons of their experience. We are indebted to committee member David Nick for arranging sponsors for the planned lunches.

Other initiatives are also under consideration, such as workshops for Board and Community-at-Large members of other committees to deepen their understanding of the many and varied options, such as 'Planned Giving' and 'Leave a Legacy', to assist in achieving one's own philanthropic objectives, or in counselling others to that end.

In closing I wish to acknowledge the faithful participation of the volunteer committee members Riette Kenkel, David Nick, Stan Nicol and Doug Parkinson.

INVESTMENT COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT - 2003 May 20, 2004

Investment starts with people just like you making a donation to the Foundation. Perhaps to establish a perpetual memory to someone or to provide long term support to something you believe in strongly. <u>IN 2003 YOU GAVE US \$113,535!</u>

Your donations were first received by a member of the Asset Development Committee who probably offered you help in writing down exactly what you wanted to accomplish through your donation. This Deed of Gift was gratefully received by the Board and acknowledged with a tax deductible receipt.

The money or perhaps the donated shares or property was immediately deposited in our bank account until the next investment committee meeting when it would be allocated to either our Bond or Equity Fund. Currently our investment securities are divided into 60% Bonds and 40% Equities. All of the Foundation's equities are in the form of mutual funds.

The Bond investments are handled personally by Lonny Andrews through RBC Dominion Securities, a service which he offers to us at no cost to the Foundation. These bonds are bought in a 6 year laddered discipline and held to maturity. They must be rated as 'A' or better by a recognized Rating agency.

The Equities are managed using the multi-asset, multi-style, multi-manager approach pioneered by The Frank Russell Company. As a global leader of multi-manager advice and investments, premier organizations and multi-million-dollar clients seek Russell's opinion on evaluating, selecting and monitoring the world's most talented money managers. Russell provides consulting services to Individuals, Corporations, Pension plans, Foundations, Endowments and Trusts totalling more than C\$2.7 trillion. This pooled (mutual fund) approach offers us the diversification of 25 specialized investment managers carefully combined in each Sovereign pool to optimise returns while minimizing risk. Russell closely follows Modern Portfolio Theory, and the Efficient Frontier Model based on the works of Nobel prize winning economists Harry Markowitz and William Sharpe.

In 2003 your new donations of \$113,535 increased the foundation's capital by 7.92%. Earned income and capital gains on our portfolio further increased it by \$96,651 – or 7.63%. This represents a 2% increase in rate of return from 2002. And this was done at a very competitive total cost of $\underline{0.92}\%$ which includes all management expenses, operating expenses and advisor fees.

2003 Bursary & Scholarship Committee Report

The ongoing challenge of increased numbers of applicants and the decreasing funds available was once again prominent in 2003. More than 80 young people applied for a maximum of 64 spaces in the interview schedule, making it necessary to review applications and eliminate those with lower than 80% overall averages — no easy task.

The committee spent 2 ½ days interviewing one student every 15 minutes from 8:30 a.m. until well after 4:00 p.m., plus part of another morning and then processing the scores to match up with specific awards. It is estimated that each committee member spent more than 60 hours in meetings, reviewing and evaluating the applications and then interviewing for more than 2 days. Those hours, particularly for those still in full time employment, are a sacrifice on behalf of the Foundation and the students are much appreciated by the chair.

The decision to move the Awards night to Clarke Theatre was an excellent decision. Thanks to the Principals' and Vice-Principals' Assoc. of School District #75 Mission who picked up the cost of the venue and to the Heritage School Culinary Arts Program for the refreshments. Feeling a little like a "sergeant major" for assigning seats to all participants, was worthwhile. The program flowed smoothly with students approaching the stage from one area and in a groups, while presenters approached from the opposite side of the stage. Pictures taken by Glen Kask were displayed in many local businesses and provide Mission Foundation with publicity and presence in the community.

The list of awards appear elsewhere in this annual report; but includes a total of 50 students who were awarded \$31,000 from Foundation funds, \$8,000 of flow through awards from Abbotsford Business and Professional Women's Assoc., Aldergrove Credit Union, Mission Hillstompers, Mission Kinsmen, Mission Rotary and the Fitch Family, as well at \$2,500 from Mission Healthcare Auxiliary, \$3,000 from UCFV and 4 tuitions valued at approximately \$14,000. This totals \$58,600 – no small accomplishment for our community. In addition, special Cedar Valley awards were administered by Stan Nicol and Lloyd Rash, in my absence, of \$1,000 plus one free tuition at UCFV.

The Bursary/Scholarship Committee's work is concentrated on a few weeks in spring, but the early planning with school personnel insures minimal conflict in dates for closure of applications and awards night. My personal thanks to everyone who has been a part of this important activity of Mission Foundation.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE REPORT 2003

Beginning this year, the deadline dates are set for March 1st, June 1st and November 1st, for a three-times-per-year Granting cycle. The committee has reviewed more than 36 applications this year and has received Board approval for grants totalling \$7,900. plus \$5000. from the Lead program. 2003 recipients of grants were:

A \$5000. Lead Grant from Vancouver Foundation allowed MF to further support Mission Search & Rescue with their purchase of a new all-terrain vehicle, \$2500. and to assist the Lifetime Learning Association in the compilation of the verbal histories of service organizations in Mission, \$2500.

Five community organizations have received \$1,714 of earnings from funds established solely for their benefit.

She has been honoured as Citizen of the Year, with the Lifetime Achievement Award and Freeman of the City in 1999. In 2001, she received her 40-year service pin from the Mission Healthcare Auxiliary. In 2002, the Queen's Jubilee Medal.

Robert Marshall served this community for 35 years as a Medical General Practitioner and is now retired. He has been on the MF board as secretary since 1997. Dr. Bob's hobbies include woodcrafting, being an active member of the BC Wood Turners Guild. He and his wife, Geraldine, have 5 children and 12 grands.

Doreen McKimmon was raised in Mission. She and her husband, Lloyd, live in Deroche and have 2 grown sons, both teachers. Doreen is very active in the community, presently active with her church and M.A.S.H. Her hobbies include quilting, reading, and gardening.

David Nick moved to Mission in 1991. He is married with 2 teenaged sons. David is the President & CEO of Fraser Valley Building Supplies.

<u>**Doug Parkinson**</u> This former bank manager is presently a Mission Councillor who has, over the years, been very active with the Chamber of Commerce, MF, UCFV, many and various municipal committees and advisory boards, and his favourite, the Mission Golf & Country Club.

<u>Carole Steger</u> came to Mission in 1982 with husband Bob and their 2 daughters. After attaining a Bach. of Business Admin. from SFU, she was involved in a series of local business ventures. Now she keeps track of business from the "home" office. Hobbies include gardening and painting.

Ian Waters has been very active in the MF since 1997 and now serves as the District representative on our board. As well as being an elected Municipal Councillor, he is involved with seniors' housing societies and other advisory committees. Ian and his wife, Marie, enjoy their 6 grandchildren, all of whom live close-by.

2003 Treasurers Report

This has not been a stellar year. Our net return available for Grants and Awards (after deducting administrative expenses) is just over 2.0 percent. We've been through years where we had in excess of 5 percent and in the 10 years of my association with the Mission Foundation I've seen a highs and lows in funds available for our purposes. Many foundations have wrestled with this problem and some have developed methods of stabilizing the amounts available each year to make the granting process more predictable. We will be discussing our options with the hope that we can find a better allocation method for the future.

The Mission Foundations fundamental function is to manage funds entrusted to it, protecting the capital and producing the best possible return on capital to issue grants and awards according to the terms of each funds trust deed. From our beginning until 1998 our investments were primarily fixed interest instruments. The Board recognized that there was a need to grow capital to keep pace with inflation as well as providing a good return for grants.

In 2000 changes to our Act of Incorporation allowed us greater flexibility in the type of investments we could use. We tried to develop a sustainable investment strategy that the foundation could use. As part of our new investment strategy we decided that we would not select and hold individual shares but rather use good mutual funds. We now have approximately 60% fixed instruments and 40% mutual funds. The markets have not recovered adequately yet so that we can benefit from this new investment strategy. To compound the problem our rising Canadian dollar has stolen a substantial part of the gains we might have expected from our US mutual funds. We hope 2004 will be different. Please review the investment committee report for additional information on our investment strategy.

In 2001 we established a Capital Stabilization Fund (CSF). This will be properly renamed this year to a reserve because it really isn't a fund. This reserve will receive earnings and distribute them to other funds. The rate of distribution will be set by the board from time to time with the intent of stabilizing the income available for distribution. Our hope is that we can build the reserve to hold a number of years of money so that in dry years we will be able to keep the granting funds at a stable level. The distribution will be for grants, awards and to capital so that as much as possible capital will grow to offset the affects of inflation. This year the remaining \$5,533 was used from the CSF to increase the funds to support grants and awards.

I believe that our plan will bring the desired results in the long term. We can only hope that the market will return adequately this year so that our equity investments can participate according to our plans.

I hope when we meet next year the results will be supportive of our goals.
