#### **ABOUT THE FOUNDATION**

Mr. G.W. (Bill) Harris, a long time Mission resident and former Mayor, saw the need for a facility whereby Mission residents would be able to leave funds, in perpetuity, for the benefit of the community and its citizens.

Such a facility was available through a Charitable Foundation. He, together with others of similar vision approached the then Dewdney Constituency M.L.A.'s for their backing. Austin Pelton and Norm Jacobsen sponsored Bill Pr404 and the Mission Foundation was born. Financial assistance during its formative stages was provided by the Mission Rotary and Kinsmen Clubs, McKnight Johnson and Partners and by the Founders.

The first fund entrusted to the Mission Foundation came through the Estate of the late Margaret Erskine, in the amount if \$228,000 dedicated to post secondary education. Today over 60 funds worth over \$2,000,000 are under administration. In addition to designated Funds, the Foundation also receives donations "In Memoriam", and responds to ongoing inquiries as to opportunities that might be administered by the Foundation.

The Foundation is managed by a Board of eleven individuals who occupy key positions in the community. There are six appointed members and the balance representing District of Mission, School District #75 (Mission), Mission Regional Chamber of Commerce, Mission Community Services Society and Fraser Valley Regional District.

An Investment Committee acts with a professional Investment Manager, using expert financial advice for the funds entrusted to the Foundation. Audit is done annually.

Official name change occurred in 2007 and new logo implemented.

Mission Community Foundation will receive funds in any amount, and issues receipts for Income Tax purposes. Named funds with specified granting request must be capitalized by a minimum \$10,000.

#### **LEGAL STATUS**

The Foundation was established by an Act of the B.C. Legislature on June 19, 1987. Official name change amendment Bill Pr 402-2007, May 8, 2007.

#### **INCOME TAX STATUS**

Mission Community Foundation is registered with Canada Customs and Revenue Agency as a Public Foundation under rules applicable to Registered Charities.

Donations qualify for individual tax relief pursuant to Charitable Registration No. 119042810R0001

- 2. Six meeting were held over the course of 2011
- 3. We are glad that we were able to set up a customer automated funds transfer (CAFT) which we felt would enable Mission residents to give on a regular basis by having funds withdrawn from their bank account. Unfortunately, despite our best efforts at promotion, the response to date has been poor.
- 4. Philanthropy Day lunch was held in November with 47 people in attendance.
- 5. Mobile Giving Foundation. The possibility of getting involved was considered, but found to be too costly with no guarantee of profit at the conclusion.
- 6. Several new funds have been initiated including two that are earmarked for animal welfare. Both are in Start- up currently.
- 7. The criteria for a future Adult Education Fund have been established.
- 8. The Builders Fund now has in excess of \$11,000. Its mandate is that the interest can now be used to top up shortfall in other fund distribution.

#### **Bursary/Scholarship Report** 2011

The Bursary/Scholarship committee was co-chaired by Gina McMahon and Mike Miles. Other committee members are Cynthia Butcher, Terry Gidda, Barry Johnston, Eleanor Lobb and Shelley Clarkson.

This year Mission Community Foundation received 114 applications. Mike, Shelley and Gina short listed the candidates down to 77 for interviews. The short listing is required for two reasons. Some of the funds available are outright scholarships and require a certain scholastic average other funds are bursaries that may be directed at a field of study or a membership in a particular organization. With these criteria in mind the short listing took place and if any member of the committee wants reconsideration of a candidate then this is done on a committee level.

We interviewed 77 very interesting students with a very broad range of interests. This took 3 days of interviews, a student every 15 minutes. Prior to this the committee members spent days reading all the applications. Many of the committee members give up work time or vacation leave to do this. The average estimate is over 100 hrs per committee member is dedicated to this task. This brings us to at least 600hrs collectively that is committed to this venture.

We gave out 74 awards valued at \$93,000. We are very fortunate that top up funds and flow through organizations allowed us to reach this level of support for the students in our community.

As the bursary/scholarship accounts grow we may have to look at other ways of meeting the needs of the students. We might have to consider larger amounts to fewer students or we need to broaden the criteria if the field of interest is too narrow on some bursaries. Benefactors are always encouraged to give direction, but an extenuating clause may be forwarded so that the money can go to another deserving student as opposed to sitting dormant because no one applied for that field of study. We will be monitoring the future needs of the students and the processes and adjust accordingly.

Eleanor has been a great Master of Ceremonies at the Mission Community Foundation Awards Night on May 4th and her knowledge and willingness to help is greatly appreciated by all members of the committee.

#### **2011 Treasurers Report**

This year we experienced significant fluctuations in the equities markets and fixed income instruments remained near an all time low. This was also the fourth year where the Canadian and international financial reporting standards have affected how we present our investment results for the year. The Stabilization account (SA) formalized in 2004 is serving it's purpose. At the end of 2011 the allocations coupled with reduced earnings for the 2011 year caused the SA to continue it's slide deeper into a deficit balance (see the Capital Stabilization Reserve - Statement of Change included with the internal financial statements). Global investment outlooks suggest that this trend while it may moderate will continue for some time into the future. All income, capital gains and losses including investment expenses and allocations to funds flow through the SA. The Foundation Board makes an allocation to each of the funds for Grants and Awards and an allocation for administrative costs from the stabilization account each year. For 2011 the allocations were reduced in response to the times. The Grants and awards allocation was reduced to 0.0% and the administrative costs allocation was reduced to 1.0%. Grants and awards for 2012 will depend on funds not distributed in 2011 plus flow through funds from organizations and some benefactors. The 2006 - 2009 levels were as follows: Grants and awards 4.5% and 1.5% allocated to cover administrative costs. The 2010 levels were: Grants and awards 4.0% and 1.0% allocated to cover administrative costs.

The Mission Community Foundations fundamental function is to manage funds entrusted to it, protecting the capital and producing the best possible return on capital to issue grants and awards according to the terms of each funds trust deed.

In 2000 changes to our Act of Incorporation allowed us greater flexibility in the type of investments we could use. The Board recognized that there was a need to grow capital to keep pace with inflation as well as providing a good and stable return for grants. Since 2000 the Investment committee and the Board have been working with our investment advisors RBC Dominion Securities to fine tune our investment strategy and increase our returns while keeping the risk of loss of capital to a minimum. We are working to develop a sustainable long term investment strategy that the foundation can follow. We now have approximately 40% fixed instruments and 60% in mutual funds and selected individual equity stocks.

In 2011 the equity portion of our portfolio produced some dividends and mutual fund distributions which were consumed by capital losses and fees. The market was volatile and some adjustments were introduced to our holdings. We hope that the market will continue to improve in 2012 so that we can restore funds lost in prior years. Many foundations have had to reduce grants as a result of the market conditions. There are alternatives and we hope to maintain the funding level for grants in 2012 and the future. This may mean that the SA will remain in a deficit position for the next three or four years. We are examining investment alternatives some of which offer reasonable returns and greater stability.

This includes the design and maintenance of accounting records, recording transactions, selecting and applying accounting policies, safeguarding of assets and preventing and detecting fraud and error.

# Our Responsibility as Auditors

As stated in the engagement letter, our responsibility as auditors of your organization is to express an opinion on whether the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position, results of operations and cash flows of the organization in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

An audit is performed to obtain reasonable but not absolute assurance as to whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. Due to the inherent limitations of an audit, there is an unavoidable risk that some misstatements of the financial statements will not be detected (particularly intentional misstatements concealed through collusion), even though the audit is properly planned and performed.

Our audit included:

- An assessment of risk that the financial statements may contain material misstatements: and
- An examination, on a test basis, of evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.

# **Evaluation of Internal Controls**

Audits include a review and evaluation of the system of internal controls to assist in determining the level of reliance that may or should be placed on the system in assessing the nature and extent of audit procedures to be undertaken.

During the course of our audit, we encountered the following specific internal control matters that we wish to bring to your attention:

No material internal control deficiencies were noted.

# **Significant Accounting Principles**

Management is responsible for the appropriate selection and application of accounting policies. Our role is to review the appropriateness and application as part of our audit. The accounting policies used by Mission Community Foundation are described in Note 2 of the financial statements, Summary of Significant Accounting policies, in the financial statements.

No New Accounting Policies were adopted this year.

# Investments- presentation as current assets:

Prior to 2010, all cash and investments had been shown as current asset (ie available for use). There should be adequate investments shown as non current to cover the endowment funds as they are not available for operations. This year (as in 2010), the investment portfolio is shown as non current. Consideration should be given in the future to the exact presentation or matching of assets held as endowment to the amount shown as endowments in the net asset section. Consideration should be given to show an amount of cash as non-current if necessary to cover the endowment amount.

# Amortization:

In prior years the internal financial statements do not record amortization. This is not in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Policies. The financial statements have be restated to record amortization and to restate the balances in accordance with this policy.

# New Accounting framework in 2012:

In 2012 the organization will have to choose between adopting international financial reporting standards or reporting standards for not for profit organizations. You should start investigating this transition now.

# **Significant Unusual Transactions**

We are not aware of any significant or unusual transactions entered into by Mission Community Foundation that you should be informed about.

# **Accounting Estimates**

Management is responsible for the accounting estimates included in financial statements. Estimates and the related judgments and assumptions are based on management's knowledge of the business and past experience about current and future events.

Our responsibility as auditors is to obtain sufficient appropriate evidence to provide reasonable assurance that management's accounting estimates are reasonable within the context of the financial statements as a whole. An audit includes performing appropriate procedures to verify the:

- Calculation of accounting estimates;
- Analyzing of key factors such as underlying management assumptions;
- Materiality of estimates individually and in the aggregate in relation to the financial statements as a whole
- Estimate's sensitivity to variation and deviation from historical patterns;
- Estimates' consistency with the entity's business plans; and
- Other audit evidence.

Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because they involve a significant degree of judgment and may have a range of possible outcomes. The most sensitive accounting estimates in order of significance are as follows:

All estimates made by management appear to be reasonable.

In the future the financial statements should contain more information regarding financial risk management and the exposure that the investment portfolio has to significant risk factors. Ie. What would happen in interest rates changed by a certain percentage? What would happen if the exchange rate changed by a certain percentage? Etc.

Perhaps your investment advisor has or can assist with this information.

# **Disagreements with Management**

We are required to communicate any disagreements with management, whether or not resolved, about matter that are individually or in aggregate significant to the foundations financial statements or auditor's report. Disagreements may arise over:

- Selection or application of accounting principles;
- Assumptions and related judgments for accounting estimates;

- Financial statement disclosure;
- Scope of the audit; or
- Wording of the auditor's report.

We are pleased to inform you that we had no disagreements with management during the course of our audit.

# Consultation with Other Accountants (Second Opinions)

Management may consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters to obtain a "second opinion". When an entity requests that another accountant provide a written report or oral advice on the application of accounting principles to a specific transaction or the type of opinion that may be rendered on the entity's knowledge of all facts and circumstances and has conducted the engagement in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards on the Reports on the Application of Accounting Principles.

We are not aware of any consultations that have taken place with other accountants.

# **Issues Discussed**

The auditor generally discusses among other matters, the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, and fees, etc. with management in during the initial or recurring appointment of the auditor during the normal course of business. There were no major issues discussed during our audit with regards to our retention that were not in the normal course of business.

As previously with the Treasurer Don Calnick, the board should consider, the implications to the organization of the reduction in net assets due to grants in excess of investment revenue or due to investment losses or reduction in market value of investments.

The foundation needs to consider it legal, moral and contractual obligations in regard to the course of action taken in this situation.

# **Difficulties Encountered During the Audit**

We are pleased to note that there were no significant difficulties encountered in perpforming the audit.

# **Other Issues**

# **HST Rebate:**

The foundation is claiming back 50% of the federal portion of the HST. You are also eligible to claim 57% of the provincial portion of the HST. This may be claimed for up to four years after the expense is incurred.

# Employee/Subcontractor:

You should evaluate the relationship with your subcontract worker to determine if they meet the criteria of an employee. This is important as CRA requires payroll remittances on employee wages and the foundation could be liable for penalties.

We shall be pleased to discuss with you further any matters mentioned above, at your convenience.

#### **Notes to Financial Statements**

December 31, 2011

# 1. Operations:

Mission Community Foundation is a non-profit society incorporated under the Mission Foundation Act of the Province of British Columbia. Its purpose is to collect funds from the community and manage these funds, using the income for the benefit of the citizens of the Mission area, in the fields of education, recreation, culture and humanities.

The Foundation is registered with the Charities Division, Canada Revenue Agency. As a charitable foundation it is exempt from taxes and can issue charitable donation receipts.

# 2. Significant accounting policies:

The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles. (GAAP)

# (a) Fund accounting:

In order to ensure observance of the limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Foundation, the accounts of the foundation follow the restricted fund method of accounting. Accordingly, resources are classified for accounting and financial reporting purposes into funds. These funds are held in accordance with either the objectives specified by the donors or with the directives issued by the Board of Directors (the Board). To meet these objectives of financial reporting and stewardship over assets, certain interfund transfers are necessary to ensure the appropriate allocation of assets and liabilities to the respective funds. Transfers between the funds are made when appropriate, as authorized by the Board. These interfund transfers are recorded in the statement of operations and changes in Net Assets.

For financial reporting purposes, the accounts have been classified into the following funds:

# (1) General Fund:

These funds are donated to the Foundation to be used at the discretion of the Board.

#### (2) Capital Asset Fund:

These funds record the capital assets owned by the Foundation

(3) Restricted Distributable Funds: These funds are available for distribution in accordance with the terms of the endowment to which they relate.

(4) Restricted endowment Funds: These funds are restricted in their use as an endowment in accordance with the terms of the endowment to which they relate.

#### (b) Investments:

Investments are recorded at fair values determined, on a trade date basis, on the last business day of the fiscal period.

# 2. Significant accounting policies:

# (i) Comparative Figures:

Certain comparative figures have been reclassified to conform with the financial statement presentation adopted for the current year. (Also see note 4)

# (i) Related party transactions:

Related party transactions in the normal course of business are measured at the exchange amount, which is the amount of consideration established and agreed to by the related parties.

# 3. Changes in accounting framework and accounting policies

The Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA) Accounting Standards Board (AcSB) has issued a new accounting framework applicable to Canadian not-for-profit organizations. Effective for fiscal years beginning on January 1, 2012 not-for-profit organizations will be required to choose between International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRSs) and Accounting Standards for Not for Profit Organizations. Early adoption of these standards is permitted. The Foundation plans to adopt the new accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations for its fiscal year beginning January 1, 2012, however the impact of this transition has not yet been determined.

# 4. Change in Accounting policy

Prior to 2010 ,the foundation recorded investment revenue on an estimated normalized basis based on a rate of return determined by the organization. Any difference between the actual revenue and the amount determined by the organization was charged to a balance sheet account called Capital Stabilization Reserve. Starting in 2010 financial statement do not follow this policy and revenue is recorded when earned as disclosed in note 1 (d) and no stabilization reserve account is shown.

#### 5. Investments

The Foundation's Investments are carried at fair value in accordance with the significant accounting policy disclosed in note 2 (b).

The foundations investments are exposed to market risk due to the changing market conditions. The Foundation manages market risk by establishing and monitoring asset allocation strategies and by diversifying investments within the various asset classes to control overall market risk. The Foundation uses the services of a professional financial advisor to advise on investment matters. Investments in foreign equities are also exposed to currency risk due to fluctuations in foreign exchange rates.
